Indirect questions

= a question which is embedded in a longer sentence

e.g. I don't know what it means.

Compare to a direct question: What does it mean?

- The word order in an embedded question is the same one as in a statement: subject verb
- e.g. Tell me where the stress is. (vs. Where is the stress?)
- When the question is a yes-no question and has no 'question word', we use if or whether
 e.g. *I have no idea if n is a natural number*. (vs. *Is n a natural number*?)

The question can be embedded in any number of sentences. Among the most common ones are:

Do you know	I can't remember
I don't know	I have no idea
Can you tell me	I would like to ask

It is natural to use indirect questions in presentations. They make them more lively.

e.g. I'm going to tell you what the difference between BLA and BLE is. I'm sure you know what N stands for. We will now look at how this works. I would like to show you...
