# **FOCUS DEFINITION**

Focus Rooth 1985; Krifka 2008

A FOCUSED expression indicates the relevance of alternative meanings of the same type. Whatever is not focused is called the BACKGROUND.

#### Question-answer pairs

- (1) A Who cooked the soup?
  - B DAVE<sub>focus</sub> [cooked the soup]<sub>background</sub>.

Alternatives to the focused constituent:

(2) {Dave, Ben, Sue, ...}

### FORMAL ENCODING OF FOCUS: PROSODY

#### Stress-focus correspondence

Daneš 1959; Chomsky 1971; Selkirk 1984

Focus contains sentence stress.

- (3) a. A Who did Dave write a letter to?
  - B Dave wrote a letter to [his BROTHER]<sub>F</sub>.
  - b. A What did Dave write to his brother?
    - B Dave wrote  $[a LETTER]_F$  to his brother.
  - c. A Who wrote a letter to his brother?
    - B  $[DAVE]_F$  wrote a letter to his brother.
  - d. A What did Dave write?
    - B Dave wrote [a letter to his BROTHER] $_{F}$ .

SF+NSR

- e. A What did Dave do?
  - B Dave [wrote a letter to his BROTHER] $_{\rm F}$ .

# FORMAL ENCODING OF FOCUS: WORD ORDER?

Free word order languages like Czech appear to utilize word order for the expression of focus; but on a second look, prosody turns out to be more important.

Daneš 1957; Šimík & Wierzba 2017; Hamlaoui et al. 2019

- (4) A Kdo napsal ten dopis? who wrote that letter 'Who wrote the letter?'
  - B<sub>1</sub> Ten dopis napsal [DAVID]<sub>F</sub>. that letter wrote David 'David wrote the letter.'
  - B<sub>2</sub> [DAVID]<sub>F</sub> napsal ten dopis. David wrote that letter 'David wrote the letter.'
  - B<sub>3</sub> #Ten DOPIS napsal [David]<sub>F</sub>. that letter wrote David 'David wrote the letter'
