## GRAMMAR FOCUS verbs with *-ing* and *to*

1 After some verbs, we usually use the *-ing* form of the verb.

*He likes playing the piano.*

verbs + *-ing* include: *like*, \_\_\_\_\_

2 After some verbs, we use the infinitive with *to*.

*She hopes to be a politician.*

verbs + infinitive with *to* include: *hope*, \_\_\_\_\_

# Expressing future: going to x present continuous

## GRAMMAR FOCUS

### *going to* and present continuous for the future

- We use *going to* or the present continuous to talk about future plans. Both forms are often possible and are very similar.
- When the plan has a fixed time or place, or includes a time expression <sup>1</sup> **the present continuous / *going to*** is more common.  
*I'm meeting a friend for lunch at one o'clock.*
- When it is a plan or intention, <sup>2</sup> **the present continuous / *going to*** is more common.  
*I'm going to change a few things.*
