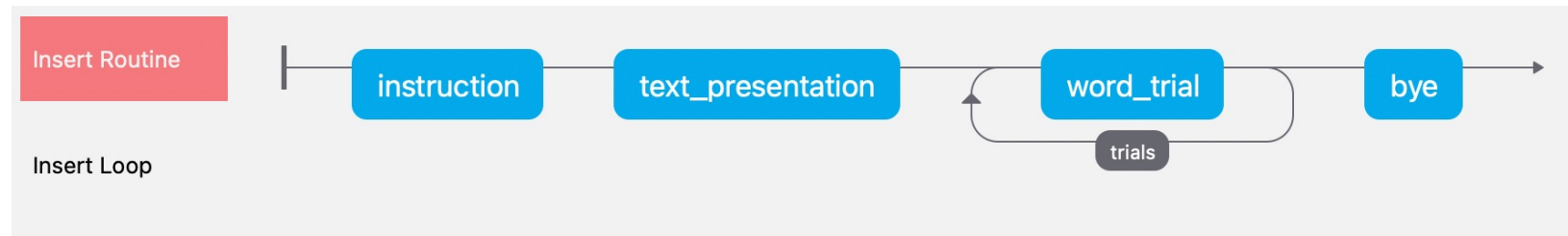


# Homework – Memory for Words

- You will show a text (few lines of conversation) and people have limited time (30 seconds to read it)
- Later the participant will see 10 words – 5 presented in the text and 5 new words – and they should decide for which word whether it was present or not

- Text
  - You can screenshot the following slide and present it in PsychoPy as picture

- Select 5 words present in the text
- Select 5 words **not** present in the text, cross-check they are not present
- Write simple instruction and simple thank you message in the end
