Hedges in Spoken Academic Language: Pragmatic Functions and Teaching Applications

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I. Pragmatic Functions of Hedging

- 1. Express fuzziness, inexactitude (the following word is not the <u>exact</u> or best word)
- 2. Express uncertainty (lack of/decreased commitment to a proposition)
- 3. Softening a stance or opinion (further qualifies/modifies the statement)
- 4. Mitigating a criticism or request
- 5. Preceding sophisticated vocabulary or jargon words
- 6. Preceding metaphors
- 7. Filled pauses

II. Analysis of Hedging in Moderating Criticism

- A. Framing, qualifying the statement as an opinion
 - 1. <u>It seems to me</u> like in this paragraph there are lots of totally different things going on. (SS: Anth Ofc Hr)
 - 2. <u>It seems to me</u> this brings up a lot of issues. (HA: Diss Def)
 - 3. And <u>I guess</u> what the committee keeps pushing, pushing back on is, well it's still possible to provide, pieces of evidence (...) and you've got to sort of embrace that <u>I think</u> to... (PS: Diss Def)

B. Hedging the suggestion or directive

- 4. So, uh, <u>I suppose I would</u> do <u>some</u> work pulling this part togeth- eh, anyway this part together into an argument about <u>sort of</u> how it's representing the community first. and then I'd go back um, to your sort of, beginning which (SS: Anth Ofc Hr)
- 5. You might wanna qualify it in that kinda way (SS: Anth Ofc Hr)
- 6. So when you're laying out the comparison between Novi and Howell in the beginning, you <u>probably</u> wanna say that kinda thing right? and <u>maybe</u> even in that paragraph where you start to describe (...)
- 7. You might just wanna like again sort of draw out some conclusions (xx) a little bit
- 8. <u>It seems to me</u> if you start you you le-didn't articulate it that way and so <u>perhaps</u> you <u>might</u>, want to make it clearer (HA: Diss Def)
- 9. <u>Maybe</u> it's a good idea, to tell, us and, actually the reader, right off the bat what you mean by an unspecified interactionist, naive theory because I'm not sure... (SS: Diss Def)
- 10. I <u>sort of</u> want to see the paragraph or the page, that makes it very clear why... (SS: Diss Def)

C. Softening a descriptor

- 11. It's a vexed, it's a <u>slightly</u> vexed position, <u>I think</u>. (HA: Diss Def)
- 12. So <u>in a way</u> that desire to make it urban <u>i think</u> is, <u>a little bit</u> disappointing (...) not that, not that I think that your project has nothing of value. It's just different <u>I just think</u> that, the d- that desire is <u>almost</u> impossible to accomplish, right? to make North Campus urban. (HA: Arch Crit)

D. Other examples:

- 13. <u>I guess</u> I do want a little bit more of a paragraph form for the methods (BS: Grad Mtg.)
- 14. S1: The thing that brought me up short a little bit and, i'm not trying to catch you on anything but I wonder if you'd just comment on it (...) so I wonder if you'd just talk about that
 - [S2: Candidate gives detailed response.]
 - S1: Well I'd be u- <u>I mean</u> it's a good, good response I <u>I guess I'm looking for something even littl- just a little more, on the technical side /S2: mhm/ <u>I think it would be</u> a good idea to /S2: mhm/ to, let your readers know... (...) <u>I think you could</u> strengthen your case /S2: mhm/ <u>a little</u> if if if, you were to do that. (HA: Diss Def)</u>
- 15. I mean, seems to me that there's a fun-there's a more fundamental problem, that, i don't hear you articulating, that we're, that, i don't, i'm not sure i know how to articulate it, but, I I don't believe that, I'm not sure that you've really, done your job in looking at the various ways you could (...) you might, you might really make it, a more fundamental contribution by, trying to work out, what the pruning dimensions are. (PS: Diss Def)
- 16. I don't know how to do it, but <u>I think</u> it would be worth your while to put a <u>fair bit</u> of time into this. (PS: Diss Def)

III. Teaching Applications

Awareness raising

- Frequency and variety of hedging devices in academic discourse
- Meanings/functions in discourse, esp. politeness/interactional functions

Exercise A: Underline all the hedges in each passage, and discuss what functions they might be fulfilling. Do they sound natural and meaningful, or are they distracting or unnecessary?

a.) What we've tried to do with our scheme was kind of two things.
